Romans 8: 18-22

Introduction

- 1. Suffering and glory are bound up in Christ's redemptive work.
- 2. Suffering and glory tell the believer's story of redemption.
- 3. Suffering and glory describe the present age and the age to come.
- 4. Suffering and glory are compared by way of contrast in Romans 8:18-22.
- I. The future glory of believers surpasses all present suffering (v. 18).
 - We long for glory because we live in the ruins of a lost world.
 - What are the three areas of contrast between our present suffering and future glory?
- II. The future glory of believers has creation standing on its tiptoes to see what is coming (v. 19).
 - What is the creation to which Paul is referring?

- What has happened to creation?
- What errors does the world make in its view of creation?
- III. The future glory of believers will be the occasion for the restoration of a ruined creation (vv. 20-22).
 - Creation is now failing to meet its intended goal.
 - Three terms that describe creation

- No theory of ecology is complete without a proper understanding of man's problem.
- The problem of man's mistreatment of nature is bound up in man's spiritual problem.
