- I. Children must grow up in a truth-rich environment.
 - A. They are viewed by Scripture as responsible to God and their parents.
 - B. It takes a home and a church to rear a child.
- II. The obedience of children to their parents is a part of their submission to Christ.
 - Parents are not to demand obedience from their children which will force them to be disobedient to God's commands.
- III. God uses a child's obedience to his parents to protect him from dangers.
 - A. A child's lack of discernment requires wise parents.
 - B. The protection a child receives is moral, spiritual, social, emotional, and physical.
- IV. Obedience is God's way of preparing children for adult life.
 - A. Obedience is necessary in order to learn respect for authority.
 - B. Obedience is necessary in order to learn the importance of regard for others.
- V. Disobedience to one's parents may be done for a variety of wrong reasons.

 - B. In order to get attention

- VI. Disobedience to one's parents is evidence that something is wrong in the heart.
 - A. The child is refusing to submit to God's authority.
 - B. The child is under the judgment of God (Rom. 1:20).
- VII. Obedience to one's parents pleases God.
 - A. Children are to listen to and follow the instruction of their parents, not because their commands are always wise or right, but because of the Lord.
 - B. The way to show love for God is to obey one's parents.
